

Starter Plant List for MEDIUM TO MOIST SOIL

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 Blueflag Iris Iris versicolor	Blue Bloom Early-Mid	↔ 1ft <u>∓</u> 3ft	Tidy vertical clumps. Host plant for moths. Pollinated by bumble bees, bees, beetles and hummingbirds.
Calico Beardtongue Penstemon calycosus	Pale Pink Bloom Early-Mid	 ↔ 1.5 ft 1.5-2 ft 	Nectar source for long-tongued bees, sphinx moths, and hummingbirds. Host plant for several moth species. Allow it to reseed.
Winterberry Ilex verticillata	 White Green Bloom Early-Mid 	 ↔ 4-10 ft	Need male and female shrubs for cross pollination . Host plant for several moths and berries for birds and mammals.
Shrubby St. John's-wort Hypericum sp: H. prolificum or H. kalmianum	Yellow Bloom Mid-Late	 ↔ 3-4 ft <u> </u> 4 ft	Small shrub. Important midseason pollen source for bumblebees. Native to sandy areas of NY and NJ. H. prolificum is a vigorous seeder.
Swamp Milkweed Asclepias incarnata	Pink Bloom Mid-Late	 ↔ 1-2 ft <u>↓</u> 2-4 ft	Clumping milkweed. Host plant for monarchs and swallowtails. Attracts multiple pollinators with its vanilla fragrance.
White Turtlehead Chelone glabra	 White Bloom Mid-Late 	 ↔ 2 ft <u> ↓</u> 1.5–2.5 ft	Tubular flower shape, great nectar source for long-tongued bumblebees. Host plant for Baltimore checkerspot and other butterflies.
Boneset Eupatorium perfoliatum	 White Bloom Mid-Late 	 ↔ 3-4 ft <u>∓</u> 4-6 ft	Long blooming, attracting wasps, bees, butterflies and flies. Flattened top makes favored landing pads for short tongued bees. Host plant, too.
Mountain Mint for Moist Soils Pycnanthemum virginianum. Other species for dry to medium sites.	 White Bloom Mid-Late 	 ↔ 1-2 ft <u> </u>	Slowly spreads. Fragrant foliage. Many weeks of floral resources for multiple insects; a golden digger wasp favorite. Lightly reseeds.
New England Aster Symphyotrichum novae-angliae	○ Purple or Pink Bloom Late	 ↔ 2-3 ft <u>∓</u> 3-5 ft	Late season butterfly-preferred blooms. Important nectar source for migrating Monarchs, and next year's bumble bee queens pre- hibernation.
Fireworks Rough Goldenrod Solidago rugosa 'Fireworks'	Yellow Bloom Late	 ↔ 2-3 ft <u>∓</u> 2-4 ft	The cultivar spreads less aggressively than the species! Important nectar source for migrating Monarchs and next year's bumble bee queens pre-hibernation.
